# FIRST LUTHERAN CHURCH The PULSEBEAT

**Dear faithful First family and friends,**

The major Festival seasons of the Church Year have come to a close. Once again, we anticipated the coming of the Messiah with Advent, celebrated His birth with Christmas, and witnessed the adoration of the wise men or magi at Epiphany. Then, along with three disciples, we heard again of Jesus's Transfiguration and journeyed together through Lent culminating in the Festival of Festivals or the Feast of Feasts, Easter. For fifty days, we sang "Alleluia" and offered our praises to the Lord for the gift of new life given from Christ's Resurrection. Finally, we celebrated Pentecost and the birth of the Christian Church and recalled the mystery of the Trinity on Trinity Sunday.

So, now what?

It is now the Season after Pentecost, also known as Ordinary Time. Gone are the blue, white, purple, and red vestments. Now, we are in the "green" season. Yet, even though the major festival season is over, there are still others—saints—whom we still remember. June presents us with three Lesser Festivals: Barnabas, John the Baptist, and Peter and Paul.



Lesser Festivals is the term Lutherans use to celebrate the lives of saints who lived around the time of Jesus. (Major Festivals or Feasts are celebrations of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.) We celebrate many Lesser Festivals throughout the year. **On June 11th, we remember Barnabas, Apostle, who, as we read in the book of the Acts of the Apostles, accompanied Saint Paul on many missionary journeys. June 24th marks the festival of John the Baptist, cousin of Jesus and forerunner of the Messiah.** John the Baptist is, of course, the one who proclaimed that the Messiah—Jesus—was coming into the world. By the way, during Ordinary ("green") time, a congregation may choose to celebrate one of the Lesser Festivals and, if the date doesn't fall on Sunday, the congregation may transfer the Festival to the closest Sunday near the date. So, for example, since June 11th falls on a Monday this year, a congregation may choose to celebrate Saint Barnabas day on Sunday, June 10th. This year, John the Baptist day falls on Sunday, so here's your warning that I will most likely be sprinkling the assembly during our liturgy that morning. **The last Lesser Festival in June is June 29th, Peter and Paul, Apostles.** It is a Festival that recalls the martyrdom of these two great apostles and the witness they were for the early church.

In addition to Lesser Festivals, our Lutheran tradition sets aside certain days as commemorations for others. These commemorations are significant men and women of the faith, but these are people who did not live during the time of Jesus. In June, we have 13 commemorations, including the Presentation of the Augsburg Confession on June 25. This document was central to the Lutheran movement as it addressed key issues of our faith for the Church in Rome in the early days of the Reformation. It is one of our foundational doctrinal statements of what we as Lutherans believe.

So, as we continue our journey through the month of June, I encourage you to remember our forebears of the faith, whose lives continue to inspire us in our own walk of faith. ## Council Update: A Positive Spirit

Even though “May gray” is here and our tasks often are challenging, your Council continues to work with a positive spirit. At our May meeting, we addressed these matters.

**Financial Status.** As of the end of April, First Lutheran’s checking account had fallen below the level that comfortably covers month-to-month operations. After careful consideration, the Council decided to redeem a money market fund (reserve fund) that has been earning low interest and to transfer those monies to First Lutheran’s checking account. This decision will preserve First Lutheran’s cash flow and avoid incurring repeated fees for money market withdrawals.

**Custodian.** Finding a reliable, individual custodian has proved unworkable. The Council will determine the more cost-effective solution between (1) hiring a custodial firm to clean the entire building twice a week and (2) hiring a custodial firm to clean the first floor and Wayne Boss, Facilities and Security Administrator, to clean the second floor, also twice a week. Custodial firms typically charge more per hour than individuals and, unlike individuals, provide their own cleaning supplies, making careful cost comparison essential. Savings from other budget items will allow the cost increase associated with a commercial firm to stay within the overall budget. In the interim, Wayne has assumed custodial duties, and the Council is grateful for his willingness to take on extra work.

**TACO Lift.** TACO President Bill Radatz and Board member Jean-Claude Chaama presented the detailed plans for installing a three-stop Savaria lift on the exterior of First Lutheran’s building. The lift will be located on the north side of the church building and will stop at the first level (church offices), parking lot, and second level (TACO offices). This project requires joint oversight by TACO and First Lutheran because TACO is paying for it and First Lutheran is the property owner. The TACO Board recently approved installing this lift. The Council concurred in their approval and directed the President to work out a Memorandum of Understanding with TACO that spells out the respective responsibilities of both organizations for the lift project. TACO will take the lead in scheduling the contractor, and both organizations will sign the construction contract. First Lutheran will designate a contact person for day-to-day responses to any contractor issues. This project illustrates both the independence and inter-dependence of First Lutheran and TACO.

**Pride Parade.** Council and congregation members are organizing marchers for the San Diego Pride Parade on July 14, 2018. See Council members Frank DeLouise or Joe DeMers if you’re interested.

**Congregation Participation.** Members of the Council are planning a 10:10 presentation between worship services on June 10, 2018, to explain the urgent need for money counters, ushers, and greeters on Sunday mornings and to encourage increased participation. Look for an article elsewhere in this Pulsebeat for more information.




31st Annual Synod Assembly—May 18-19, 2018—Hope Lutheran, Palm Desert

## Go & Tell: Giving Voice to Faith, Justice & Blessing

The 31st Annual Pacifica Synod Assembly was held on the campus of Hope Lutheran Church in Palm Desert. A change from our history of holding synod assemblies at hotels, the expansive church campus and warm hospitality of the members of Hope Lutheran provided the perfect location for our synod to gather. We are extremely grateful for their hard work both prior to and during the assembly. Our theme of “Go & Tell: Giving Voice to Faith, Justice & Blessing” shaped our time together as we heard the stories of others, along with sharing our own stories, of God’s presence in our lives and in our world.

The ELCA’s Churchwide Representative for this assembly was Mr. William “Bill” Horne II, ELCA Vice President. This year’s keynote addresses were provided by four of our synod rostered ministers, who shared examples of giving voice to faith, justice and blessing in their lives and ministry, through their heartfelt and moving reflections.

Throughout the assembly, we were given the opportunity to hear the many stories of God’s faithful people from across our synod. Business of the assembly was conducted through elections, resolutions, memorials and budgets. Reports were shared, grant recipients celebrated and ministries lifted up. We were blessed to close our day on Friday with an inspiring worship service.

We give thanks to all who attended this assembly. Your participation and dedication to the ministries of and through this synod are a gift to this synod and the wider church. We also are grateful for those who prayed for this assembly. We especially give thanks for the village it takes to hold a synod assembly—our Assembly Planning Team, Synod Council, worship team and the MANY on-site volunteers and staff from the two local congregations (Hope and St. John’s) and elsewhere. We ARE church together for the sake of the world!



Kao Kalia Yang, the author of this month's selection *The Latecomer: A Hmong Family Memoir*, was born in a refugee camp in Thailand and immigrated to St Paul, Minnesota when she was 6 years old. Thousands of Hmong families made this journey from the war-torn jungles of Laos to America, but their history remains largely unknown. Kao Kalia Yang was inspired to share her family's story after the death of her grandmother. Her memoir is a tribute to the remarkable woman whose spirit held them all together. As one reviewer has written, "A must read for all Americans. Ms. Yang has written her family's story that is all of our stories as descendants of immigrants."
