Dear faithful First family and friends,

It's that time again: Advent—that season in the liturgical Church calendar when we prepare our hearts to receive the greatest of all gifts, the gift of God's only beloved Son, Jesus. Yes, it's Advent culminating in that glorious festival of Christmas. What a celebration, indeed. If you're like me, just hearing the word "Christmas" makes me recall beautiful carols (even while typing this sentence, I can quite literally "hear" those carols ringing in my ears), smells of the season, and the wonderful food we often over-indulge in. Yes, this is the season of gift-giving, the season of family and friends, the season of love come down in the person of Jesus.

This gift of love come down makes me think of a word: *gentleness*. Yes, for even amidst the hustle and bustle



of the holiday season, even amidst the joyously boisterous songs of Christmas, even within the chopping down of Christmas trees and the noise of loading the trees on our vehicles, this is a gentle season. For even though tiny babies do cry and make noise, there is something oh-so-gentle about these tiny persons: they are gentle.

It's in that spirit—the Spirit of Christmas and the Spirit of the little babe Jesus—that gentleness happens: for on that most miraculous of all nights, in the cool quiet of an evening, Jesus was born. Jesus, this gentle child of God, came down to become like you and me: a human being to live as one of us. When I think of *gentleness*, several Christmas carols come to mind: “Away in a Manger,” “O Little Town of Bethlehem,” and “Silent Night, Holy Night.” But among my favorites is another gentle, quiet song, “Infant Holy, Infant Lowly.” In this song, we see this *O Magnum Mysterium—O Great Mystery—*of the baby Jesus.

*Infant holy, infant lowly, for his bed a cattle stall;
oxen lowing, little knowing Christ the child is Lord of all.
Swiftly winging, angels singing, bells are ringing, tidings bringing:
Christ the child is Lord of all! Christ the child is Lord of all!*

*Flocks were sleeping, shepherds keeping vigil till the morning new
saw the glory, heard the story, tidings of a gospel true.
Thus rejoicing, free from sorrow, praises voicing, greet the morrow:
Christ the child was born for you! Christ the child was born for you!*

(Evangelical Lutheran Worship #276)



Here we see a vision of those who witnessed the birth: the animals in a stall, the angels singing and announcing this birth, sheep and shepherds, and the loving mother—the Blessed Virgin Mary and the father Joseph. This assortment of characters make up our Christmas story, but even today some two thousand years later, we become characters in this divine drama as we hear, sing, and celebrate again in this season of love come down, this season of a gentle baby born for all humanity. But more, this gentle baby born for all of creation. And so celebrate—again—this gift of gentleness, this gift of love, this gift of a Savior who came down for you. But for now, let's wait in this our season of Advent. And let's prepare our hearts to receive God's greatest of all gifts.

Council Update: 'T is the Season of Thanksgiving

For many of us, Thanksgiving has more than one meaning. Lots of us enjoy getting together with family and friends to share good food and give thanks for blessings received. We even pause to reflect. And as soon as the Thanksgiving celebration ends, we shift into high gear to get ready for the Christmas season and all the tasks we want to accomplish before the end of the year. The Council is no exception. Now that Thanksgiving is over, we're in high gear, too. Here's a summary of our meeting on November 27.

Devotion. We began with Margie Wahlsten reading to us from Anne Lamott's book “Traveling Mercies.” In this selection, Ms. Lamott writes about the quirky and loving Presbyterian congregation that enfolded her and her son Sam into their community in bad times and good. Something many of us can relate to at First Lutheran.

Finances and Budgeting. The Finance Committee (Anke Hartung, Jeremy Kaercher, and Kem Taylor) presented a budget for 2019 based on projections for 2018 and analysis of five years of income and expenses. They are projecting an actual deficit of \$50,000 for 2018, which is what the 2018 budget anticipated. First

Lutheran has liquid assets to cover this deficit. In other words, we will take in about \$50,000 less than we spend in 2018, and we will use savings to make up the difference. In planning for 2019, the Council anticipates another deficit year. Based on the pledges received to date from about half of First Lutheran's households, the Council estimates the 2019 deficit at about \$64,000. The majority of First Lutheran's expenses are fixed rather than discretionary, e.g., salaries, insurance, utilities, and taxes, and the Council works hard to keep discretionary expenses as low as possible. The congregation will get a more detailed presentation at its meeting on Dec. 9.

Safety and Hygiene Policy. The Council's TACO Liaison, Frank DeLouise, is working with TACO to expand the safety policy adopted last year to include hygiene procedures for cleaning up mishaps. The policy envisions cleanup kits will be available and individuals will be trained in their proper use. First Lutheran and TACO agree such a policy can be most effective if both follow the same procedures.

TACO Use Agreement. The Council's consensus is the draft use agreement Council members Dick Krueger and Carol Schultz have been working with Bill Radatz and Jim Friedrich (TACO Board members) suitably spells out TACO's use of space and facilities in First Lutheran's building. Key sections of the agreement include TACO's payments to First Lutheran, use of designated spaces by TACO, and both organizations' respective responsibilities for maintenance and expenses. Given that the TACO Board discussed but did not act on the draft agreement, the Council agreed to continue discussions with TACO. The Council also noted the relationship between First Lutheran and TACO involves both ministry and business, and this agreement focuses on the business side.

Bylaws. The Council approved two revisions to First Lutheran's Bylaws for a vote by the congregation at its meeting on Dec. 9. The first revision clarifies the qualifications set forth in the Constitution for serving on a call committee or committee dealing with interim ministry. Only voting members may serve; associate members and seasonal members are ineligible. The second revision specifies that any two authorized signers may sign checks equal to or exceeding \$500 rather than requiring that one of those signers be the Treasurer. Practically speaking, this change will make it easier to get checks processed in a timely manner while providing the security of a second authorized signature.

Thank you to everyone who participated in First Lutheran Church's fall stewardship campaign. As of November 28, 68 of our households committed a total of \$204,490.00 to support our ministry in 2019. Your financial stewardship pledges guide FLC's Church Council as it looks forward to the year just ahead, so it is particularly helpful that as many members of the church as possible provide a pledge. For the past three years, First's annual budget has averaged \$405,000, of which \$325,000 was achieved through our weekly pledged envelope offerings—80% of the annual budget. You can see that every pledge supports the major portion of each year's ministry here at First Lutheran.

The annual budget for 2019 will be presented for approval by our members during the Annual Congregational Meeting, Part 1 on Sunday, December 9. If you have not yet returned your completed pledge card for the coming year, we invite you to do so as quickly as possible. In this season of thanksgiving as we look to Christ's coming, we celebrate his love freely given for us as we give of ourselves.

“Welcome the Babe” Advent Event

This year we again invite our FLC family to join our Lutheran World Relief Advent outreach event, “Welcome the Babe.” Every mother worries about her baby’s health and well-being. For the fifth year in a row, our congregation will help mothers in poverty by preparing Baby Care Kits for infants around the world born into less than ideal, and sometimes desperate, circumstances.

Through the generosity of our FLC sponsors we provided 23 LWR Baby Care Kits in 2014, 39 kits in 2015, 43 kits in 2016, and 44 kits in 2017. Thanks to a large donation from Tiffany, a friend of Melinda Person, we already have a great start on collecting some of the kit items, and during the 2018 campaign we are aiming to assemble more than 50 kits.

There are many levels of participation, ranging from shopping for single items, to sponsoring partial or entire kits. You can make the shopping a family event or have a “personal shopper” do it for you. You can sponsor a kit in honor of a loved one, making a donation in their name and sending them a LWR “Honor Card.”

After Christmas, the Baby Care Kits will be blessed then packed to be sent the Lutheran World Relief warehouse in St. Paul, Minnesota. From there the kits will be shipped to refugee camps, hospitals, and villages around the world as needed.

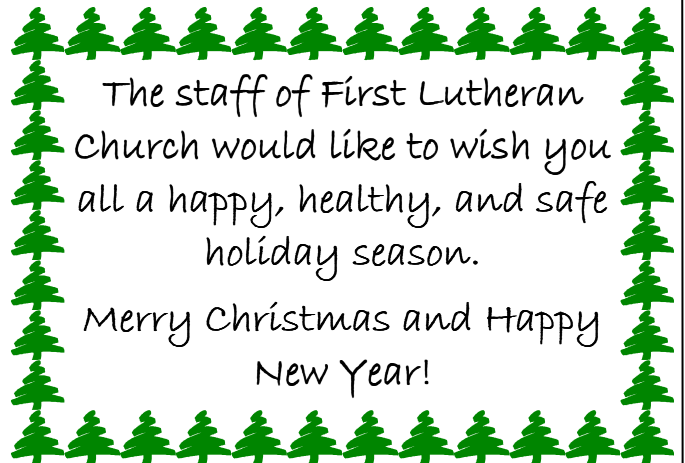
