Council Update: Waiting with Hope

First Lutheran's Lent meditations booklet is titled "Waiting with Hope" this year. Personally, I like the title phrase, although at times I'm tempted to wonder, "Just who is Hope, and where is she keeping herself these days?" (Pause for laughter.) One of the reasons I like the phrase "Waiting with Hope" is because it is firmly grounded in the present while beckoning us to the future. As we wait, we experience hope in the here and now, and hope by its nature points to the future. As Council members, we "wait with hope" by paying attention to what's in front of us even as we plan for possibilities to come.

<u>Devotion</u>. Pr. Darryl Kozak opened the March Council meeting by reflecting on Isaiah 43:19 (NRSV), "I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and riv-

ers in the desert." Pr. Darryl reminded us that telling the Gospel continues even though he is leaving First Lutheran to become pastor of Peace Lutheran in Corona, CA. And it's natural to meet new experiences with anxiety, curiosity, and hope.

Pastoral Transition. President Dick Krueger announced the next pastor to serve First Lutheran will be Pr. Rich Ajer, one-time pastor of Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran in La Mesa. Bishop Andy Taylor has selected Pr. Ajer to serve as First Lutheran's "bridge" pastor until we call our "settled" pastor. Pr. Ajer will arrive at First Lutheran the first week of May. Pr. Darryl will assemble a calendar of pastors to preach and preside at worship services in the interval until Pr. Ajer's arrival.

Financial Report. The Council continues to monitor income and expenses carefully. As anticipated, First Lutheran's income is running behind expenses. Treasurer Kem Taylor noted she adjusted the 2019 budget to reflect First Lutheran's mortgage will be paid off in October of this year.

New Council Member, After reviewing several possible candidates, Council members reached a consensus to name Kara Oien to fill the vacancy left by Jeremy Kaercher's resignation. Kara works as a Deputy Public Defender for the County of San Diego and frequently participates in First Lutheran's book group. Note to those candidates who said, "Ask me again in 2020"—you can count on it!

Pride Parade. Frank DeLouise has registered First Lutheran to march in the San Diego Pride Parade on Saturday, July 13, 2019. Susan White will help spearhead First Lutheran's participation. Ask Frank or Susan how you can get involved.

Property. Dick Krueger oversaw installation of new thermostats throughout First Lutheran's premises. He also reported seams around roof vents were resealed to prevent leaks during future rainstorms. To reduce costs, First Lutheran and Third Avenue Charitable Organization (TACO) will continue to share Internet service under a new contract with AT&T.

As you can see, Council members handle a wide variety of business and managerial matters. Representing the interests of our fellow congregation members is a privilege and a responsibility we take seriously. We invite you to share your questions, concerns, or appreciation with any Council member.

2019 Special Lenten Offering

This has been an exciting time for our congregation as we continue to learn more about immigration and the asylum-seeking process. A family being cared for by a fellow Lutheran congregation is being assisted by our Lenten Giving project this year as we raise funds to pay for an attorney to take them through their asylum hearings. We're halfway through Lent and we have raised \$5,266.15 towards our goal of \$7,000. The family originated in Eritrea, fled to Saudi Arabia, then Turkey, then Brazil, and up to Tijuana and San Diego. They are in the United States legally as they await their asylum hearing(s). We've broken down their journey into miles and at \$.50 per mile (14,000 mile journey and \$7,000 goal) they are have made it to Panama. We need to get them to San Diego!!

Lutheran Disaster Response

Lutheran Disaster Response brings God's hope, healing and renewal to people whose lives have been disrupted by disasters in the United States and around the world. When the dust settles and the headlines change, we stay to provide ongoing assistance to those in need.

U.S. Flooding

The situation

Heavy rainfall has caused rapid snow melt that has resulted in major flooding across at least four states. So far, three people have died and hundreds of homes and businesses have been affected. Mandatory and voluntary evacuation orders remain in place. According to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, 200 miles of levees have been compromised in four states and historic flood levels have been recorded at 42 locations across six states. Though water is receding, more rain is anticipated in many areas, along with warmer weather that may melt snow and ice and raise water levels further.

Our response:

Lutheran Disaster Response is responding to this emergency through congregations, synods and our affiliates across Nebraska, Iowa, Wisconsin, and Missouri.

Cyclone Idai

The situation

Cyclone Idai made landfall in Mozambique on March 14. It has caused widespread flooding and destruction in parts of southeast Africa, including Mozambique, Zimbabwe and Malawi. Over 200 people have been reported dead so far. With many still missing or requiring rescue, there are concerns that more than 1,000 people may have died. Thousands are awaiting rescue from near the city of Beira, Mozambique, where floodwaters are still rising.

An estimated 1.5 million people have been affected by this devastating storm, which is being reported as one of the worst weather-related disasters ever recorded in the Southern Hemisphere.

Our response:

Lutheran Disaster Response is working with our global partners and companions to respond to this disaster. In Zimbabwe, for example, ACT Alliance members are planning to provide blankets, hygiene kits, food, clothing and diapers for up to 6,000 adults and children to ensure that basic needs are met. We are also reaching out to our companion churches in Mozambique, Malawi and Zimbabwe as they assess needs in their communities and prepare to respond.

What you can do:

<u>Pray:</u> Please pray for the communities that are impacted by Cyclone Idai or have been affected by or lie in the path of flooding. May God's healing presence give them peace and hope in their time of need. Pray that God will deliver comfort to those mourning the loss of loved ones and strength to those working diligently to care for affected communities.

<u>Give:</u> Gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response marked either "Cyclone" or "U.S. flooding" will be used in full (100 percent) to assist those affected by these crises until the response is complete.

Volunteer Nursery Attendants

Ecumenical Meeting in U.S. to Follow Up on Joint Declaration on Doctrine of Justification

Leaders of five Christian World Communions meet at the Catholic University of Notre Dame in the United States next week to discuss the significance of the Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification (JDDJ) and its impact on their search for full, visible unity of the church.

The joint declaration was signed by Lutherans and Catholics in Augsburg, Germany, on 31 October 1999, effectively resolving one of the key conflicts of the Reformation. It stated clearly that the "earlier mutual doctrinal condemnations", with which Catholics and Lutherans accused each other of heresy at the time of the Reformation, "do not apply to the teaching of the dialogue partners" today.

The declaration added that both partners will continue to work together for further clarification on subjects such as the relationship between Scripture and doctrine, ecclesiology, authority, ministry, the sacraments and the connection between justification and social ethics.

From bilateral to multilateral

Initially signed as a Catholic-Lutheran agreement, it has since been joined or substantially affirmed by three other Christian Communions, namely the World Methodist Council in 2006, the Anglican Communion and the World Communion of Reformed Churches (WCRC) in 2017.

The document paved the way for the past two decades of progress in relations between Catholics and Lutherans, including the 2017 Joint Commemoration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, hosted by Pope Francis and the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) leaders, former President Bishop Dr Munib A. Younan and General Secretary Rev. Dr Martin Junge in the Swedish cities of Lund and Malmö.

Challenging the churches

Yet despite the extraordinary ecumenical significance of this agreement, many Christians in countries around the globe remain unaware of its existence and its implications for shared worship, study, public witness and practical service.

The Notre Dame University consultation will take place from 26-29 March with the goal of highlighting the historic importance of the declaration and exploring further developments in inter-church relations that could result from a more effective reception and implementation at local, national or international level.

The meeting will challenge leaders of the five world communions to share new and creative ways of visibly demonstrating the theological progress of the past two decades through the daily life of their local churches.

During the consultation, the university, which has a long-standing commitment to furthering ecumenical and interfaith relations, will also host two public events. On the evening of 26 March, an ecumenical prayer service will be held in the Basilica of Sacred Heart with music provided by the Notre Dame Liturgical Choir.

On 28 March, as the consultation draws to a close, a panel discussion among leaders of the different denominations will take place entitled 'From Conflict to Communion: The Future of Christians Together in the World'.

Among those attending the consultation are Rev. Dr Martin Junge, the LWF General Secretary, Cardinal Kurt Koch, President of the Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity, Rev. Dr J.C. Park, President of the World Methodist Council, Rev. Chris Ferguson, General Secretary of the WCRC, and The Most Rev. Dr Josiah Idowu-Fearon, Secretary General of the global Anglican Communion.

The Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification was the result of over three decades of ecumenical dialogue between the Lutheran World Federation and the Roman Catholic Church.
