


FIRST LUTHERAN CHURCH The PULSEBEAT

"A Christian is a perfectly free lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is a perfectly dutiful servant of all, subject to all."

-Luther's Works: Treatise on Christian Liberty; The Freedom of a Christian

With these words we have, in a nutshell, Luther's understanding of what it means to be a citizen in the world and a citizen of the Kingdom. In this coming election cycle we are privileged to, again, be able to exercise this blessing held in tension. (Just so you know, the whole treatise can easily be found online and is widely quoted, for better and for worse, across the whole spectrum on American Christianity.)

During the month of February, on each consecutive Sunday, we will host one of the four leading Mayoral Candidates for San Diego at our 10:10 Adult Forum hours between worship services. What a blessing it will be to hear from these hard-working public servants. We won't agree with everything they stand for but we can learn from



each of them about being better citizens of our city. We will all be given the chance to learn more about being free subjects and dutiful servants.

You may or may not be a resident of the City of San Diego, but you all belong to this region and you all belong to First, which is a witness to the Gospel heart of Jesus in the heart of this City. I encourage you to come, attend, participate, and invite a friend.

In preparation for our first candidate this Sunday, I went to <u>ELCA.org</u> for our national church body and found our policy statement on "The Church and Society: a Lutheran Perspective." It was adopted in 1991 and since I can't say it better, I have found a few quotes that both inspire and challenge me. I commend them to you as we embark on this month-long exercise in civics.

THE CHURCH IN SOCIETY: A LUTHERAN PERSPECTIVE

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America is called to be a part of the ecumenical Church of Jesus Christ in the context in which God has placed it—a diverse, divided, and threatened global society on a beautiful, fragile planet. In faithfulness to its calling, this church is committed to defend human dignity, to stand with poor and powerless people, to advocate justice, to work for peace, and to care for the earth in the processes and structures of contemporary society.

Christians fulfill their vocation diversely and are rich in the variety of the gifts of the Spirit. Therefore, they often disagree passionately on the kind of responses they make to social questions. United with Christ and all believers in baptism, Christians welcome and celebrate their diversity. Because they share common convictions of faith, they are free, indeed obligated, to deliberate together on the challenges they face in the world.

Deliberating on Social Questions

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America commits itself to foster moral deliberation on social questions. Through its congregations, synods, and church-wide organization, and affiliated institutions and ecumenical relationships, this church shall seek to:

- be a community where open, passionate, and respectful deliberation on challenging and controversial issues of contemporary society is expected and encouraged;
- engage those of diverse perspectives, classes, genders, ages, races, and cultures in the deliberation process so that each of our limited horizons might be expanded and the witness of the body of Christ in the world enhanced;
- draw upon the resources of faith and reason—on Scripture, Church history, knowledge, and personal experience—to learn and to discern how to respond to contemporary challenges in light of God's Word;
- address through deliberative processes the issues faced by the people of God, in order to equip them in their discipleship and citizenship in the world;



- arrive at positions to guide its corporate witness through participatory processes of moral deliberation;
- contribute toward the upbuilding of the common good and the revitalizing of public life through open and inclusive processes of deliberation.

Welcome the Babe 2019 Final Update

If you missed our year-end review in the FLC Annual Report, this is a quick update for our "Welcome the Babe" Advent campaign. Once again we reached a new record high, both in number of supporters and number of completed Baby Care Kits. This year your contributions have allowed us to assemble 63 kits, nearly triple the 23 we first put together six years ago. Likewise, the number of people supporting this outreach has more than doubled, increasing from 14 in 2014 to 34 this year.

The kits were blessed on January 5th and will be distributed by Lutheran World Relief wherever they are most needed around the world. 
The Narthex is the focus of this month's highlight.
