Two different songs, two different traditions, only one star. The one star of

Bethlehem that shone forth in the night providing biblical direction that first Christmas still shines for God's people. Long ago both the shepherds, the lowest of the low, and Magi, seers from foreign lands whom if they hadn't been laden with precious cargo would have been deeply suspect, found their way to the manger birth of the infant savior. These unlikely and diverse leaders in worship were guided by a common vision to offer their praise and awe. The Christmas story is a surprise, through and through.

Today it can again be the same. The star of Bethlehem can still surprise us. It can still bring diverse and unlikely leaders to give thanks to the manger of Christ. But it sure doesn't feel like it can. It feels like our culture is so diverse, so disconnected, so fractured right from left, wealthy and poor, us and them, that there is no way we can come together. Maybe the star isn't bright enough anymore. Maybe the truth of faith isn't true enough. Maybe the truth of God's surprise has lost its luster.

I believe otherwise. I believe in the power of God's light to bring diverse people together in one hope, in humility to the manger where they might experience the power of awe, the pleasure of praise and the promise of abundant joy. I believe that the Gospel truth entrusted to us is bright enough to gather people from diverse places and cultures and open their lives up to the child of God, Jesus.

Today, as I write, it is the third day of Christmas. Somewhere someone is giving three French Hens to their true love and someone somewhere else is getting nothing. For every person celebrating in these days, there is another who dwells in darkness but yearns for light. For every person feasting with friends and family, there is another person who is hungry for someone to know their name and to whom they may share their story. We are surrounded by those who would love to be known and to know the bright light of God's love. I believe it is time to be surprised.

Epiphany is upon us. On Sunday, January 5, we will celebrate the homage story of the Magi. In the weeks we will follow the star. May we be deeply surprised by what we see.

Council Update: Another Revolution Around the Sun

As I sat down to write this update, I remembered some of the events First Lutheran experienced during the revolution around the sun that has been 2019. Most obvious, of course, were changes in our leadership. Pr. Darryl Kozak accepted a settled call to Peace Lutheran in Corona CA in March. After a few months with Pr. Rich Ajer as bridge pastor, we welcomed Pr. Kurt Christenson as our settled pastor in September. Just as Pr. Kurt arrived, we had to say a sad farewell to our Director of Music Jared Jacobsen, who died in a traffic accident. Bob Plimpton agreed to come out of retirement to serve as interim organist, ably assisted by congregation members who accompany and direct the choir. And those events are just the tip of the iceberg. (You'll find the rest in the annual report to the congregation at the meeting on Jan. 19, 2020.) My point simply is, whatever the circumstances, First Lutheran remains steadfast and hopeful.

At the Council's monthly meeting on Dec. 17, 2019, Pr. Kurt Christenson opened the meeting by reading an excerpt from the last chapter of Charles Dickens' "A Christmas Carol" and reflecting on the elements of redemption and new life in the story. Council members then focused on the following topics.

<u>Financial Report</u>. At the end of November, First Lutheran's operating deficit remained the same as it was at the end of October. From 2016 through 2018, First Lutheran's expenses increased only 4.8% and revenue declined 17.5%. The Financial Stability Team continues to examine ways of balancing revenue and expenses, and the Council will consider this issue further at its annual planning retreat in January.

<u>Congregation Meeting</u>. First Lutheran conducts its annual meeting in two parts. The agenda for the first part in December includes electing Council members and adopting a budget. The agenda for the second part the following January includes the annual report and other business requiring congregational action. The upcoming meeting on Jan. 19, 2020, will include voting on (1) amendments to First Lutheran's Constitution mandated by the ELCA and (2) revisions to the Bylaws intended to clarify existing procedures. Congregation Meeting: Business "As Usual"

When should a congregation schedule its annual meeting—in December so members can plan for the coming year or in January so members can review the past year? First Lutheran's answer is, "Yes!" And, no, we don't meet at midnight on New Year's Eve. Our Bylaws specify a two-part annual meeting. The first part is held in December with an agenda that prepares for the coming year, and the second part is held the following January with an agenda focused on reviewing the past year.

On Dec. 8, 2019, First Lutheran's congregation held Part 1 of its annual meeting and conducted the following business.

Electing Council Members

President Dick Krueger presented a slate of four candidates recommended by the Council to fill four vacant seats in 2020, three for three-year terms and one for a two-year term. Candidates were: Allison Emery, Kara Oien, David Pohl, and Kem Taylor (two years). Congregation members offered no additional nominations, and they elected this slate by unanimous verbal acclamation. Kara and Kem already serve on the Council. New Council members Allison and David both served on the Transition Team that prepared the Ministry Site Profile during First Lutheran's interim between settled pastors and David served on the Call Committee.

Adopting the 2020 Budget

The congregation adopted the budget presented by the Council by unanimous voice vote. For the third year, First Lutheran anticipates a budget deficit, which the Council and Financial Stability Team are addressing. Because more than 85% of First Lutheran's expenses are fixed rather than discretionary, e.g., salaries, insurance, utilities, and taxes, opportunities to reduce spending are constrained. The congregation affirmed by consensus that (a) distributing the draft budget two weeks in advance of the congregation meeting and (2) including notes for the line items were useful and advantageous to continue.

Part 2 of the annual congregation meeting is scheduled for Sunday, Jan. 19, 2020, between worship services. The Council will present the 2019 annual report, including actual budget numbers for the past year, as well as proposed amendments to First Lutheran's Constitution and Bylaws.


Meet & Greet Mayoral Candidates!
